Program Notes and Translations

Mass of the Children

John Rutter (b. 1945)

John Rutter's *Mass of the Children (2003)* seeks to renew focus onto future generations. Rutter's incorporation of children's chorus as a key component and equal player throughout this work draws quick comparison with Benjamin Britten's *War Requiem (1962)*. Further inspiration from the *War Requiem* is apparent in Rutter's seamless incorporation of the Latin sacred mass alongside English texts from Thomas Ken, William Blake, and Lancelot Andrews. As its name would suggest, the Mass of the Children follows the missa brevis, or short mass. This reduced length of this work does not diminish the intention of this piece, asking its listeners and performers to consider the daily lives of children, and how youth finds a way to persist through even the darkest times.

It Takes a Village

Joan Szymko (b. 1957)

"It takes a village to raise a child"—a West African adage that is reflected in cultures worldwide. The support and education that we give to new generations comes not from any one individual, but is experienced through the efforts of the community. Listen for Szymko's use of repeated rhythmic grooves, or ostinato, to represent individuals joining in community to raise hope for future generations.

It takes a whole village to raise our children. It takes a whole village to raise one child. We all, everyone, must share the burden. We all, everyone, must share the joy.

Rules for Behaviour, 1787

Kirke Mechem (b. 1925)

Bay Area composer Kirke Mechem is known for a coquettish wit that is incorporated seamlessly across all his compositions. Mechem first came across the text for this piece from a plaque that hangs on the wall of the vestry at the Stanford University Memorial Church. Earliest sources of these "Rules for Behaviour" place them as far back as London 1701. Here, Mechem's precocious setting of these otherwise stodgy words illustrates a rebellious and youthful spirit.

Decently walk to thy seat or pew,

Run not, nor go wantonly.

Shift not seats, but continue in the place where your superiors order you.

Fix thine eye on the minister;

Pray with him when he prayeth, at least in thy heart;

Children Will Listen from Into the Woods

Stephen Sondheim (b. 1930) arr. Mark Brymer

Brymer's ethereal arrangement of "Children Will Listen" from Stephen Sondheims *Into the Woods* is equal parts tender and cautionary. In the finale of the musical, "Children Will Listen" reminds listeners to the impact even the most fantastical stories can have on children.

How do you say to a child in the night, "Nothing's all black, but then nothing's all white?" How do you say "It will all be alright" When you know that it mightn't be true? What do you do?

What do you leave to your child when you're dead? Only whatever you put in its head. Things that your father and mother had said, Which were left to them too. Careful what you say.

Children will look to you for which way to turn,

Animal Crackers, Vol. 1

Eric Whitacre (b. 1970)

Whitacre's "Animal Crackers" are a raucous foray into the words and rhymes of poet and humorist Ogden Nash. Over the course of his life Nash penned over 500 quips and rhymes that cover a wide range of topics-from cities and baseball teams to general observations. Nash's style is typified by clever rhyming schemes and witty response. Here, Whitacre sets three animal themed poems that demonstrate the classic Nash style.

The Peace of Wild Things

Jake Runestad (b. 1986)

Seeking refuge from increasingly tumultuous days, where everywhere one turns there seems to be an impermeable shroud of violence and anguish, "The Peace of Wild Things" calls for a return to the solace found in nature. Runestad's setting of this text, penned by Wendell Berry, explores a longing for and return to oft-obscured natural sanctuaries.

When despair for the world grows in me and I wake in the night at the least sound in fear of what my life and my children's lives may be. I go and lie down where the wood drake rests in his beauty on the water, and the great heron feeds. I come into the peace of wild things who do not tax their lives with forethought of grief. I come into the presence of still water. And I feel above me the day-blind stars waiting with their light. For a time I rest in the grace of the world, and am free.

Wheels of a Dream from *Ragtime*

Lynn Ahrens (b. 1970) and Stephen Flaherty (b. 1968) arr. John Leavitt

Set in New York City at the turn of the 20th century, *Ragtime* explores the American promise through the eyes of three people as they struggle to navigate through a rapidly changing socio-economic landscape. The character Colehouse Walker Jr., loosely based off of Scott Joplin, is an ambitious Black musician who is excited to begin a new life with his wife Sarah and their newborn son. Having just purchased a new car, Colehouse and Sarah sing "Wheels of a Dream" with renewed optimism for their future.

I see his face, I hear his heartbeat I look in those eyes--how wise they seem Well, when he is old enough I will show him America And he will ride on the wheels of a dream

We'll go down south (Go down south) And see your people (See my folks) Won't they take to him (They'll take to him) Like cats to cream

Well we'll travel on from there California or who knows where And we will ride on the wheels of a dream Yes the wheels are turning for us girl And the times are starting to roll Any man can get where he wants too As long as he's got some fire in his soul

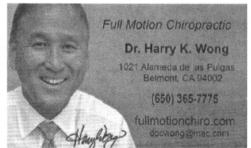

Artist Bios

Jeffrey Benson is currently Artistic Director of Peninsula Cantare and Director of Choral Activities at San José State University. Previously, Dr. Benson served as Director of Choral Activities and Fine Arts Department Chair at H-B Woodlawn Secondary Program in Arlington, Virginia. The Washington Post hails his choirs for singing "with an exquisite blend, subtlety of phrasing, confident musicianship and fully supported tone...that would be the envy of some professional ensembles."



Dr. Benson has served as cover conductor for the Grammy award-winning Washington Chorus, where he helped to prepare the

ensemble for Maestros Julian Wachner, Leonard Slatkin and Marvin Hamlisch. In 2006, Benson was invited to La Universidad Americana in Managua, Nicaragua to assist the university in forming the first a cappella choir at the institution.

Choirs under his direction have performed on multiple state and regional conferences of ACDA and NAfME and have toured throughout the United States and Europe, including invited performances at The John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, The White House and Washington National Cathedral. Recently Dr. Benson's choirs have been invited to perform with the Rolling Stones, Andrea Bocelli, the Los Angeles Festival Orchestra and the Skywalker Orchestra. In 2006, the Woodlawn Chamber Singers under Dr. Benson's direction were the only high school choir invited to sing on the National Conference of Chorus America in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Benson received his Master's degree and his Doctorate in Choral Conducting/Music Education from The Florida State University and his Bachelor's degree in Music Education from New York University.





Founded in 2003 by Artistic Director Peggy Spool, *Vivace Youth Chorus* of San José is a choral music education organization with 13 core and ancillary programs for youth in Silicon Valley. The programs balance vocal training, music literacy and theory, and performance, while providing exposure to various musical genres, from classical to traditional folk, jazz, and popular music. Based on the Kodály philosophy, we teach musicianship skills through singing, movement, and activities. This pedagogical approach allows students to naturally progress from our introductory Rising Notes classes to our advanced Chamber Choir and Teen Men's and Women's Ensembles

These advanced performing choirs frequently participate in artistic collaborations, choral festivals, and tours. This summer, Vivace is embarking on an international tour to Costa Rica to perform in local communities and work with internationally acclaimed musicians. Past collaborations have included performances of with Peninsula Cantare, The Choral Project, San José Symphonic Choir, Opera San José, San José Chamber Orchestra, Nova Vista Symphony, Mission Chamber Orchestra, Symphony Silicon Valley, and jazz pianist David Benoit. In addition to collaborative performances, Vivace frequently sings at civic events, such as the City of San José's Make Music Day 2019 and Experiments in Sound series on the Sonic Runway.



Artistic Director *Peggy Spool* founded Vivace Youth Chorus in 2003. She has worked with youth choruses in the San Francisco Bay Area for over 25 years, including having prepared children's choruses for Opera San José, San José Symphonic Choir, and Mission City Opera. Prior to founding Vivace, she was a music director at Cantabile Youth Singers in Los Altos, California. She maintains a private vocal studio, teaches the children's choir at Stone Church of Willow Glen, and performs regularly with Resounding Achord.

Ms. Spool received a Bachelor of Music in Vocal Performance from Boston University, a Master of Music in Vocal Performance from San Francisco Conservatory of Music, and a

Certificate in Kodály Music Education from Holy Names University. She is a member of the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA), National Teachers of Singing, and the Organization of American Kodály Educators. Currently, she serves on the boards of the ACDA Western States Division as the Repertoire and Standards Chair for Children's and Community Youth Choruses and of the Silicon Valley Arts Coalition.



Emily IIsu began her piano and musical training at the age of three and had won several prestigious accolades by the age of ten. After moving from Taiwan to the Bay Area in 1996, she studied with renowned pianist Rebecca-Sen Chan. Since then, she's won numerous competitions including the U.S. Open Competition, Young Pianist's Beethoven Competition, and San José Jazz Society Piano Competition. Emily is a graduate of the University of California, Davis where she studied music and computer science.

In addition to having an extensive and accomplished solo career, Emily is a

collaborative musician by nature. In addition to her work with Dr. Jeffrey Benson and the San José State University Concert Choir, Emily has served as the accompanist for the California All-State Choirs. She has arranged numerous choral repertoire for the Tzu Chi Foundation and Bo-Ai Chorus. She has also aided Dr. Jennifer McDowell on the completion of her songbook The Women's Basketball Songbook, performed with the Cambrian Symphony under the direction of Maestro Scott Krijnen, and worked closely with distinguished music educator Jim Yowell for over a decade.

Soprano Danielle Marie is an emerging young artist in the South Bay area of Northern California. Nothing is more fulfilling to Danielle than singing oratorio, spirituals, and sacred works. Danielle received her Master's Degree in Voice Performance at San Jose State University, studying under Professor Layna Chianakas. Prior voice instructors include Sandra Bengochea, Dr. Nicole Baker, and Mary Scheibe. Danielle has been the soprano soloist for a number of major works, including Orff's Carmina Burana, Mozart Requiem, Mozart Vesperae solennes de confessore, Brahms Requiem, Haydn's Lord Nelson Mass, and Schubert's Mass in G with various groups in the Bay Area including Dr. Jeffrey Benson and the following choruses: Peninsula Cantare, the Bay Area Singers, San Jose State University



Symphonic Chorus, Michael DiGiacinto and the Winchester Orchestra, Lou De La Rosa and the Winchester Orchestra, and Kristina Nakagawa and Resounding Achord.

Danielle is often engaged as a soloist to sing African American spiritual repertoire, including the most recent addition of The Journey of Harriet Tubman, with different choirs around the Bay Area.
